

A question asked by a reader: What is The Star all about? What does it represent?





William "Bill" Davila Guitarist - STARS OF IDYLLWILD




Courage is demonstrated in such different ways. We often see where it takes courage to stand for something that you believe in. Whether anyone agrees with that belief or not. Sometimes it takes courage to just stand. And then there are those whom it will take every ounce of strength they have to even speak.

If you have not heard of or listened to William "Bill" Davila, guitarist, and musician extraordinaire, The Star would like to introduce you. William "Bill" Davila is not only an internationally recognized guitarist, but he is a prolific musician, music professor, radio personality and producer, recording artist, composer, vocalist, audio engineer and musicologist. He is also an award-winning published poet.



Even though Davila has all this in his repertoire, he is also an amazing individual who wears more badges of bravery than some five-star generals I have met. Taking into consideration, those who trained for battle have a bootcamp experience to prepare for what life or war throws at them. There is no intent to minimize the impact of the trauma that many of our veterans have weathered through. However, when as a child life brings a bombardment of experiences parallel to the warfare trauma as that of an adult soldier, life can surround an individual and take them to a place no one would volunteer to go, and few would escape.

This week, The Star met an extraordinary guitarist and individual, William "Bill" Davila. Experiencing an early life that no one would wish for anyone, it is not short of a miracle that such an individual can and does rise above the ashes, to express through music that they are very much alive. Davila has shared his gifts and talent with so many others, that they might grow into accomplished musicians and be elevated in the music industry.

Their weekend music starts early in the day, when Fratello's opens for lunch and ends at closing time in the evening. It is not unusual to see little children moving to a new beat as their parents reminisce to popular tunes from years past.

Sugar Bear brings a little old school with a new school vibe to their style, as he makes his selection of sax. David notes that there is not a song list, but requests are welcome as he introduces the third entity to the group, "Phillip or (Fill-up) D' Jar." The tip jar is always available to accept donations of gratitude with gratuities. With David on the keyboard, Sugar Bear picks up his sax, and with Fill-up present, the trio is ready.

David recalls his coming to Idyllwild. Sugar Bear asked him to come up to Idyllwild to entertain with him. "I've been playing with him for about 5 and a half years."

David shares, "One of the things that brings me back is the ambiance here, the people and the city itself. Where I'm from it's all hills, mountains, and trees. So, anytime I come up here, it is like going on vacation and going home." Sugar Bear adds, "We have met some great folks and had good times up here."

"A couple years ago, we did a show here in Idyllwild, inside the Rustic Theatre. We brought up a few drummers and some other musicians. 
Supervisor Perez Statement on Desert Healthcare District - Press Release

COACHELLA VALLEY – Supervisor V. Manuel Perez is speaking out in strong and urgent disagreement over a decision by the Desert Healthcare District Board of Directors to relieve its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Conrado Bárzaga, of his duties. Supervisor Perez became aware of the decision today and will be writing a letter to the Desert Healthcare District for its meeting on Tuesday evening.

"This was very shocking to learn of this morning, that Dr. Bárzaga, an experienced and capable administrator of the Desert Healthcare District, was suddenly removed from his position. In his tenure over the past four years, working with the Board, Dr. Bárzaga helped the district serve the entire Coachella Valley, bring equity and address health disparities and the health crises of COVID-19, monkeypox, mental health, opioid overdose and homelessness.

"It doesn't appear that there was any reason given for the change in Dr. Bárzaga's employment with the Desert Healthcare District. We would have to gather information to make sure it was truly a matter of performance, and not on some unfair grounds. In my opinion, Dr. Bárzaga was the best CEO and his positive impact on the district was noticeable. I am hoping the Desert Healthcare District Board will reverse this decision." Supervisor Perez's office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.



Greetings Fellow Home Chefs!Gary here. Today and next week I want to share with you some of my favorites. Some of these recipes go back over 60 years. (Older than me)


Chef Gary

you will know why its called Icky Bread.



Wounded Knee Bill passes U.S. House

Legislation to preserve the site of the Wounded Knee massacre has cleared the U.S. House of Representatives Via AP news wire Wednesday - 9/20/2023

The Wounded Knee Massacre Memorial and Sacred Site Act, introduced by Republican U.S. Rep. Dusty Johnson of South Dakota in May, passed the House by voice vote. The Senate is considering companion legislation.

More than 200 Native Americans - including children and elderly people - were killed at Wounded Knee in 1890. The bloodshed marked a seminal moment in the frontier battles the U.S. Army waged against tribes.

This Historic Landmark in South Dakota ensures that the area was preserved as a sacred site. Leaders of both tribes testified in support of the House bill, which would put federal protections on the land on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

Oglala Sioux Tribe President Frank Star Comes Out did not immediately return a phone message seeking comment on the bill's passage. In a previous statement, he said: "We must remember the sacrifices our ancestors have suffered for us. What happened at Wounded Knee is a reminder that we as a Qyate (people) have succumbed incredible odds to survive, so we must honor our ancestors by preserving the land for future generations to come."

CARRYING CAPACITY OF THE HILL

Some of my favorite childhood memories are of summer vacations when my parents took my sister and I to Yosemite Valley. We drove straight to our favorite camp site #14, and if that one wasn't available, we found our second favorite site. Many years later, after I got married and moved away from home, my husband and I frequented Yosemite, but just for day trips. It was always awe inspiring, and a peaceful place to hike, or sit by the Merced River. We had a casual lunch and shopped for mementos.

Going forward several decades, and considering the influx of people into California, it became necessary to make reservations months in advance to camp out in Yosemite.

It was reported, by friends, that the quality of their experience, the air, and the natural environment were being negatively impacted. Studies showed that the trails were eroding, endangering the root system of plants, and nearby water quality.

Reportedly, the presence of people disrupted the feeding and breeding habits of many animals as they focused on the threat that people posed, instead of their everyday subsistence.

Campfires were causing air pollution and had to be regulated. The increased lines at local restaurants were causing people frustration. Car traffic was constant. The noise and trash were excessive. The overall experience of the visitors was being negatively impacted and diminished. And the natural environment was being degraded. It was determined that overcrowding in Yosemite diminished the visitor's experience, and the natural environment. The incredible valley had reached its carrying capacity.

Some people refer to this area of the San Jacinto Mountains as the "Yosemite of Southern California." It is this writer's experience that started when I began coming up to the Hill in 1950, when my grandparents built a cabin. I moved up permanently in the early 70's, and since then I have lived in Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Fern Valley, Mountain Center, and Thomas Mountain Village in Garner Valley. Needless to say, I've seen some changes come to this unique area.

Back in the 90's there was an organization called the Idyllwild Municipal Advisory Council (IMAC), also referred to as HillMAC. It was comprised of local people who were concerned about the carrying capacity of the area.

Issues that were considered included: maintaining the unique mountain village character, the quiet rural environment, the forest Ecosystems within and beyond the perimeter of the village.

In addition, there was concern for the water and air quality, septic and sewer availability, as well as adequate services for public health and safety.

Studies show that a carrying capacity overload occurs when the population growth causes excessive demands on nature. And can result in adverse effects on residents and visitors to the area. This impacts the safety of both, as well as natural ecosystems.

IMAC sought to assure that land use policies and development practices minimize risks to property and property and provide for only safe, sustainable development and growth.

Has this area, the Hill, reached its carrying capacity? Do we need HillMac or IMAC to return to address sustainable issues and concerns? What do you think? Contact: The Star at jo.monroepublishing@gmail.com
