It's Almost Here...AEP by Deshaundra Jones

The anticipation is building for October 15th. The first day of Annual **Enrollment Period for** Medicare beneficiaries to decide whether to change, keep, add or drop their Medicare Advantage, Medicare Supplemental and prescription drug plans. Insurance companies, agents and brokers are finding ways to interact with the 65 plus year old American to assist in selecting the plan that works for the member.

Mass communication floods radio, phone, TV, newspaper, restaurants, stores, mail, email and more for months.

Sometimes advertising efforts cause seniors to be overwhelmed with too much information, unsure of who to trust although eager to get free benefits. The Center for Medicare and Medicaid has changed contact rules in an effort to reduce misinformation and high pressure sales tactics.

Beginning October 1, 2023 there is a 48 hour waiting period when setting an appointment to change, add or drop a Medicare Advantage, Medicare Supplement (also known as Medigap), or a prescription drug plan. The delay is not designed to be an inconvenience. It is designed to make sure the beneficiary knows what they want and are getting. This lets them think, consider questions, and make a selection without remorse.

There are several factors to consider about your health insurance for next year. Questions are: Are my prescriptions covered? How much will it cost? Does my doctor accept original Medicare or Medicare Advantage now? Do I need denture or bridge work? Is transportation included? If I don't have Medicaid, what is available for me? A licensed sales representative has been licensed by the State of California and certified by

an insurance company with a privatized Medicare contract. They are informed of plan benefits, federal regulations, and state expectations for members. Insurance agents are required to pass standardized tests, at various percentages, to get Medicare certified every single year by each company they represent.

Some sales representatives are "captive" and work with one insurance company. Others are "non-captive" so they can represent several insurance companies. Armed with training, an individual licensed sales agent is not giving an opinion or misinformation, like other people do.

It is my professional industry experience to share: know who you are talking to and their title. Not everyone saying or advertising they are a Medicare representative or a sales agent is not licensed and certified to do so. At this exciting time with choices, new plans, and

changes of benefits for Medicare options, I have one request: *know who you are talking to*. Are they state licensed and medicare certified? Ask them, it's okay. They may answer phone calls and get your information so you can be transferred to a sales person SOMEWHERE.

Let's have a good experience with health insurance this year. Good information is at your fingertips. Online: www.medicare.gov

In person there are local health insurance offices where walk-ins are welcome, or you can attend local seminars about Medicare Advantage or Medicare Supplemental with food included in your area.

Navigating through Medicare choices should be stress free, informed and upfront. Locate an independent agent with reputable experience and companies.







Reconnecting with our Forest Home - Part 2 Kathy Harmon-Luber

Following our last article about connecting more deeply to this living, breathing forest, here are simple ways to rekindle, integrate, anchor, and embody reconnection and reciprocity. Children (and the child within us all) will love these ideas!

As you greet the day outdoors, recognize our forest is our life support system: You're breathing in the sky and far reaches of the universe. Streams from the high country bring the precious elixir of water. Wandering the land, Earth supports you.

We humans are woven into the forest tapestry, not separate from it: What's your relationship with the forest? Are you a conscious steward? Or are you causing harm by using pesticides and other poisons? What steps can you take to care for our forest and our other-than-human kin?

Get curious: Learn the plants, animals, geography, ancestral inhabitants, elements. What can they teach you? Can you develop new eyes of wonder to see the teeming diversity of life beyond the ubiquitous trees, squirrels, and pinecones? Do you notice the sound of wind through the trees (psithurism), or identify birds by their song? Let yourself be in awe of the beauty and miracle of it all.

Embrace creative expressions of reciprocity: Hum to the trees; sing to the stars; share words of endearment, prayers, or poetry to the critters; draw or paint beauty you witness; write a love letter to the land; leave a gift of water, flower petals, seeds.

Honor nature with your presence: Just be, sit in rapt attention, take off your shoes and absorb earth energy through your feet. ground your energy to the land and tree roots, feeling deep anchoring connection. Integrate into your daily practice meditating with the boulders or trees. Keep a journal to hold insights and moments of enchantment.

Consider making a high impact offering: A native plant garden for the pollinators; water feature for wildlife; bee nesting box, or bat box.

Make visible your gratitude to Mother Nature: Create a sacred altar space in your home or yard, with gifts from the forest (feathers, rocks, pinecones, cedar fronds, acorns).

Through reconnection and reciprocity, we can find powerful personal healing and ways to help our forest and planet.

SOBOBA INDIANS

For centuries the Soboba Indians occupied the land now known as Hemet, San Jacinto, and Winchester. Today, their reservation covers 8000 acres in San Jacinto, and the foothills of the San Jacinto Mountains. Before Mexican, and then American, occupation of their land, the Soboba Indians were totally self-sufficient. Their orchards, gardens and animals were watered by tributaries from the San Jacinto River, and more than 40 perennial springs. They respected and appreciated the natural environment that sustained them.

The Soboba Tribe has a diverse history because some members came from both Cahuilla and Luiseno ancestry. In 1834, the Mexicans secularized the missions, and the Rancho San Jacinto, which had been claimed by Mission San Luis Rey for cattle ranching, was granted to Jose Antonio Estudillo, Jr. He respected the Indians, but in 1868 his heirs began selling portions of the ranch. By1880 most of the land had been sold, and the Soboba people had no legal claim to their land or water rights.

Around that time, land that included the Soboba Village, its cultivated fields, and all of its water, was awarded to Mathew Byrne of San Bernardino. He let the Soboba people live there while he grazed sheep on the land. Then he decided that he would evict the Indians if the government didn't pay him for his land. In 1883 he was granted his eviction order, but the Sobobas filed an appeal. A landmark decision was made in 1888 by the California Supreme Court which ruled unanimously in favor of the Soboba people. For the first time the state's high court voted to uphold the land rights of an individual tribal group. Unfortunately, a year later, that decision was reversed because the tribe had no valid title to their lands, even if they could prove continuous use and occupancy going back hundreds of years. The Byrnes heirs held onto his property, until 1903 when the State of California seized the lands for non-payment of taxes. The California

Legislature sold the land to the federal government and the deed was recorded on September 11, 1911. Ultimately, the legal title was held in trust for the Sobobas by the Department of Interior. Meanwhile, from 1865 to 1893, diversions of the San Jacinto River and its tributaries by new settlers wiped out nearly all surface water flow through the Soboba land. Deprived of this water supply, their gravity-flow irrigation system became useless by 1899. The U.S. Indian Services constructed a well system on the reservation in 1909, utilizing the waters of an underground aquifer. Unfortunately by 1930, that water source was dwindling because of upstream diversions, and intensive withdrawals by non-Indians. Still, there was some surface water available from the many springs and creeks in the upland parts of the Reservation. These water sources supported settlements, orchards, farming and stock watering. Unfortunately, this meager source of water disappeared almost completely with the construction of the San Jacinto Tunnel, beginning in 1933.


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

The San Jacinto Tunnel was part of the Colorado River project, meant to bring water to Southern California. By 1937, the perennial springs that once fed the Soboba's land ceased to flow. Between the change in water flow from the tunnel, ongoing diversions from the San Jacinto River, and ground water pumping by non-Indian neighbors, the Soboba people were left with no viable sources of water and they lost their once flourishing agricultural economy.

Wisdom of Youth

Loudest in the Silence by Madison LaMont

"Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10a

Lately, I have been pressed with the realization that as a society we are submerged in noise that is always constant. In my own life, I notice that I never take time out of the day to just be silent; still. In 1950 the Soboba people spoke out for their water rights, and after 10 years of deliberation between the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and the Eastern and Lake Hemet Municipal Water Districts, they were granted water rights of 9000 acre-feet per year, including the construction of water projects to facilitate the implementation of the Soboba people's water rights.

I want to thank each of you for partnering with the Idyllwild Fire Protection District in our ongoing fire prevention efforts. You put in some incredible abatement work that helps to keep our beautiful mountain community "fire safe".



Each of us has chosen to live in this incredibly beautiful place, and as we are all too aware that comes with the responsibility of year-round fire abatement. As we move into the cool days of autumn and hopefully the wetter and colder days of winter, please remember to exercise fire safe practices. Many of us find the winter holidays a favorite time of year; colorful decorations, warming our feet by the fire, hanging ornaments, and those special times with friends and family. We hope you've already had your chimney inspected this year. If you have not had your chimney inspected, we highly recommend getting that done.

Here are a few fire prevention tips we'd like to pass along to help you enjoy a "fire safe holiday season".

Chimney Cleaning

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recommends getting your chimney cleaned and inspected every year. A chimney inspection and cleaning can eliminate hazardous soot and glazing that could be in your chimney. A thorough inspection will also ensure the integrity of your chimney and fireplace to make sure it's ready for use.

Be sure that you are only burning the appropriate fuel product(s) in your fireplace or wood stove, ensure that you are burning seasoned wood. The less moisture there is in the wood, the less soot buildup will happen. Never burn trash or other inappropriate items in your fireplace.



Always properly dispose of ashes from the fireplace and wood stove with care. Hot coals can still be found in the ashes. Make sure to wear gloves, and don't use a plastic bucket or cardboard box for disposal, these can melt or catch fire from the hot coals, only use an approved metal can with a lid for proper removal of ashes.

Never Burn Your Christmas Tree

In several parts of our country, it is not uncommon for folks to dispose of their Christmas tree by chopping them up and burning them. This is *not* legal in Idyllwild and a bad idea. Unless the tree has been properly cut and seasoned for burning, it can become a fire hazard.

Smoke and Carbon Dioxide Detector Check

Please make sure all of your smoke alarms and carbon dioxide detectors are in working order. We recommend changing your batteries annually.

Always Keep An "Operating" Fire Extinguisher On Hand

It is extremely important to maintain working fire extinguisher(s) for your home. Fires can happen unexpectedly, and it is always recommended to keep fire extinguisher(s) close by to put fires out before they can grow. Idyllwild Fire Protection District will be happy to work with you on placement and proper use of your home fire extinguishers.
